Pastor Mark's Remarks:



Easter.....

the Ultimate Game Changer of Life!

If someone had told me they had seen my father alive two days after he had died, I would have told them: "You're nuts!" After all, I had sat beside my father's bed for two days as he got weaker and weaker. I held his hand and sang, "Jesus Loves Me" as he took his last breath. And my sister and I had watched him die. He was gone! I had seen it with my own eyes! There would be little chance I would believe he was suddenly alive, no matter who told me!

Yet, that's exactly what happened to the women as they came to the tomb and heard the angels' message: "Why do you look for the living among the dead. He is not here. He has risen!" It's no wonder the disciples dismissed the women's report as an idle tale and did not believe them. And yes, they probably thought the women were "nuts", or at least in so much shock that they were "seeing things!" Wouldn't we react the same way? I know I would!

Can we even begin to imagine the reality that Jesus was really alive again?

Can we imagine the shock and terror in realizing the news wasn't just a rumor, but absolutely real. He stood right before them all and said: "Peace be with you!" Luke describes the disciples' reaction so honestly: "They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost." If I suddenly saw my father standing alive in front of me, I would be doing more than shaking in fear!

Yet, like so many circumstances that shock or frighten us, the story of the disciples' reaction to the news "Jesus is alive!" doesn't end there!

Through the ensuing days and weeks, the reality of new possibilities of life started to emerge and transformed the ways they regarded EVERYTHING!

We can see how they were changed and transformed! Within a couple of months these uneducated country men were passionate and surprisingly eloquent as they told crowds about God's rescue in Jesus' forgiveness. Fearless, they defied the religious leader's reprimands and threats.

They healed the sick and crippled people, as they cared for Jerusalem's poor and destitute. And most importantly, they carried on Jesus' mission without missing a beat! Why? Because Jesus' death and resurrection was the ultimate game changer of life!

As I reflect upon the reality of my father's recent death and the message of Easter, I wonder whether I need to recapture some of the disciples' radical life change and transformation... to see once more the Empty Tomb as life's ultimate game changer! Can the Empty Tomb help me see new possibilities in places and situations where death and darkness seem to prevail? Can the celebration of Easter this year transform any defeatism attitudes lurking inside me, into a passion for the new opportunities God wants to bring to me, as well as others? The obvious answer for me is, "YES!"

What about you? What new possibilities do you need in your life? Where does the ultimate game changer of Easter need to transform and radically set you in a new direction? Don't know yet? Well, please join me in the journey of Easter as we walk along with the disciples as the angels' message: "He has risen!" changes everything!

Dear Friends of Grace,

I want to thank you for the wonderful ways in which you reached out to me and my family upon the death of my father. I cannot express how I felt as I sat at the kitchen table, when I returned from his funeral and read your cards and notes of sympathy. Frankly, I was numb. His sudden death left me sad and overwhelmed. But, as I opened the first card, then the second and the third, and all the rest you've sent me, I have realized again how important my church family is to me!

When I returned to church, so many of you gave me a hug or a word of encouragement! You ministered to me, and I felt blessed and strengthened! It is funny how this Christian community works in our lives, isn't it!

And so, I'm on a journey of grief, not unlike the ones you have travelled on from time to time. But I am so grateful for you all. I know Jeannie and the rest of my family feel the same way. You have been a real ministry of Grace in the heart of the Hellmanns! Thank you!

Pastor Steve's Remarks:



Bulbs, Buds, and Breakouts

This has been a long winter. It's hard to remember that this time last year it was eighty degrees! Not this year. Can I be honest? I'm tired of winter. It's cold and dark. The doctor told my daughter re-

cently that the winter sun in Minnesota is so weak that you could stand outside all day long with no clothes on and not get one bit of vitamin D from the sun (but you might get frostbitten!)

During these cold dark months, it seems like nothing could possibly be green and growing again. It's frozen and lifeless. Does your spirit ever feel that way? Many of us have suffered great loss this year. Loved ones have died. Marriages have broken apart. Friendships have drifted. Jobs have been lost. Sometimes it feels like hope is frozen and will never bloom again.

The big question that lurks in the background during this wintery season is this: Where is God in all this? How could God let winter happen? What is God doing? When things are frozen, it really does seem that God is silent, or even absent.

Here's the interesting thing about winter. Beneath all the piles of snow and the layers of ice, there is life. Fish are swimming at the bottom of the lakes. Certain mammals are barely breathing, just on the brink of death, in hibernation. The bulbs lay buried, just below the frost line. These things lie there, waiting. Slowly, patiently, they wait. The waiting is long, and silent, and sometimes frostbitten, but it is not dead.

It will happen. The days are getting longer. The sun is growing stronger. The snow will melt. The ice will turn back into liquid life. The bulbs will push up through the ground. The branches will bud. Life will break out and conquer the death-like grip that winter has on the land.

God is at work, even in the bitter cold. Jesus did not stay in the tomb. Life has swallowed up death. My prayer for you is that no matter how cold it might be for you right now, you know that hope breaks out in unexpected ways every day. May we know God's hope anew this Easter season.

We continue to make wonderful strides in our *Free 2B Grace Campaign*. So far, the *Free 2B Grace Team* of 25 volunteers has been able to connect with 162 families (27.7% of our families) in order to share the vision we have here at Grace. To date, 14.9% of the families at Grace have pledged over \$911,215.

These are incredible metrics that match up with our core values and give us great cause to celebrate as: weConnect, weGrow, and weEquip!

Our heartfelt appreciation goes out to those who have already accepted the invitation to meet individually with the Free 2B Grace volunteers and engaged in conversation about the future of the church, prayed along side the church leadership, and prayerfully considered a sacrificial gift to help us meet the vision before us. If you have not been contacted yet, please know the team continues to work hard to reach all the families here at Grace.

We took great steps in 2012 in covering our monthly mortgage; still the ongoing shortfall impacted our available Capital Funds. In February 2013, we finally turned the corner thanks to the *Free 2B Grace Campaign* and are slowly building the fund back up. Monies pledged are gradually starting to be received. We expect this trend to continue and build as the campaign progresses through the next 5 years.

Just as our personal savings build slowly over time, the funds will build slowly here at Grace over the next five years. This means, in time, we will be able to begin work on some of the safety and deterioration projects at Grace. While we would like to fix everything all at one time, we are taking a conservative approach and will fix items like the sidewalk, roof, and tuck pointing as funds become available.

We will continue to keep you updated as we progress with the *Free 2B Grace Campaign*. Again, thank you Grace Family, for your support!

Stewardship:

Stewards of God's Abundance

Vibrant stewards embrace financial health as an expression of faith. We allow money to flow to and through our lives in ways that nourish us and our world. We recognize that our capacity to give is defined by our hearts, not our pocketbooks.

Personal finances can be a touchy subject, so I feel it's important to say upfront that there is no judgment intended in this article. We are each in different places financially for different reasons. Many among us are struggling financially, and the causes may be of our own doing or may be due to a misfortune over which we had no control. Others among us have more than sufficient financial resources.

Money and even wealth is not in itself bad, no more than food is bad. The biblical prophets rail against the rich, not specifically because they are rich, but because they are rich and oblivious. The rich man in Jesus' parable in Luke 16:19-31 is doomed to eternal torment because he was luxuriously rich and completely oblivious to the destitute Lazarus lying just outside.

One wonders how things would have turned out if just one of those at the rich man's feast had called his attention to the poor man at the gate.

Over the past several years, I have been fortunate to work in a community foundation. Through extensive study of private, community and corporate foundations, I have come to understand and appreciate the great things that have been and are being accomplished when people use their wealth for the good of all.

There are countless real-life examples of allowing money to flow to and through our lives in ways that nourish us and our world. The challenge for us imperfect humans, wherever we are on the spectrum, is to maintain a balanced relationship with money.

God calls us to be disciples as whole persons, all the time, engaged in all aspects of life on earth. And in this day and age, life on earth involves money. Our personal financial health is an important dimension of our overall health in faith. To put our finances in order, we have to order our lives and priorities, as well.

Craig Ford is a former missionary who shares thoughts on debt-free living, frugality, generous giving and simple living. He explained, "As I look into financial issues, the more I realize it is about more than math. In fact, I've been surprised how often the emotional and spiritual components of a financial decision outweigh the mathematical."

Personal financial health is best achieved in the same way as personal physical health: develop good daily habits and have an annual check-up. Good habits include basics like preparing a budget so that we live within our means, saving, giving, paying debts on time and continuing to learn about financial issues.

Our annual financial check-up includes making a personal balance sheet. We record all the details of personal assets: bank accounts, investments, retirement accounts, real estate, cars and furnishings. Then we record all the details of personal liabilities: credit card debt, mortgage and student loan debt. Does the ratio of debt-to-assets indicate that we are living within our means? We review property and life insurance coverage to ensure that it is accurate and adequate. Have we developed the discipline of saving for emergencies as well as saving for retirement? Being financially healthy frees us to live a productive and joyful life in service to God. We are stewards, on behalf of God, of all that we have and all that we are. Stewardship is not a program. It is a way of life!

Grace Music Academy:

In the fall of 2005, Grace initiated a ministry to build upon our Core Values of connecting, growing, and equipping the greater community. The result was the entrepreneurial start up of Grace Music Academy. The vision for this missional outreach included becoming a funnel to encourage and increase musical potential at Grace, along with the surrounding community. Over the years, GMA provided a wonderful opportunity to enhance the musical life of many people, but in recent years has not been able to meet expectations.

While we have been committed to GMA, economic conditions have resulted in a declining enrollment limiting our opportunity to meet the overriding mission.
